Bickleigh Vale Roadside Vegetation Plan Review 2019 Preamble

BACKGROUND

In 2010, the Bickleigh Vale Roadside Vegetation Management Plan was published and successfully implemented in Bickleigh Vale with the following aims:

- 1. Prepare a management report for the roadside vegetation including plans, photographs and illustrations.
- 2. Provide a plant removal and planting list.
- 3. Meet on four occasions with the Friends of Edna Walling and Yarra Ranges Shire Council.
- 4. Prepare a draft budget for expenditure or \$20,000 in the 2010/2011 financial year to implement recommendations of the management report. A staged plan is to be provided for future works.

PLAN REVIEW OBJECTIVES

Friends of Edna Walling's initial aims of this Plan Review are:

- 1. Study the roadside vegetation as it is now compared to that planned in December 2010 and identify:
 - a. How well the intent of the Plan has been realised
 - i. What has worked?
 - ii. What hasn't worked?
 - iii. What, if anything, has not been implemented yet and why?
- 2. Prepare a second stage plan to adjust and supplement the original Plan where required in order to preserve the cultural and aesthetic significance of the roads and roadside vegetation

Incorporated into the second stage plan should be:

- a. The items listed in 1a above
- b. Recommendations on substitute plants for those from the original Plan that have not thrived and to take into account the changing climate.
- c. Residents to be encouraged to clear the Bickleigh Vale Road gutter and road of leaves and pine needles when a heavy rain event is forecast to minimise blocking of culverts and the Pembroke Rd drain.
- d. A regular program for "whole of roadside" mulching every 5-7 years should be included in the updated Plan to assist in weed control which is a perennial problem and can be significantly helped by keeping up the mulch.
- e. It was noted that the original plan was deliberately Bickleigh Vale Rd / Edna Walling Lane-centric and that it would be desirable to include at least Pine Rd in the revised Plan.

Management Activities Summary

- 27/05/2014 Road Maintenance: Bickleigh Vale Road and Edna Walling Lane are maintained by the topping up the surface three times a year with Lilydale Toppings and then grading it. Yarra Ranges recently advised that the Mitchell Quarry is closing and hence the supply of Lilydale toppings is running out permanently. There is perhaps a year or two left before we will have to change to a different product so Friends of Edna Walling need to the replacement between Coldstream and Castella toppings. The decision was to go with Coldstream toppings as is is closest in colour and consistency to the original Lilydale toppings.
- 29/11/2015 November 29th, 2015 Working Bee: Today saw the first major trees and shrubs replacement activity by Friends of Edna Walling since the original Roadside Vegetation Plan implementation with 39 new trees and shrubs provided by the Shire planted in 5 locations. Area 1:
 - Location 1, outside Hurst Abelia x grandiflora 'Nana', replace 1st pine removed
 - Location 2, outside Hurst Lagerstroemia indica (white, 'Natchez'), replace 2nd pine removed
- 7/06/2016 The Winter Working Bee the main projects for the day:
 - remove the ivy from the roadside outside Littlewood and Abbotsley and then to lay cardboard under mulch to slow its return
 - filling in the many potholes in the road that have developed during the recent wet weather
 - Regular weeding near the entrance to Pembroke road
- 28/08/2016 Winter Working Bee 2016 Projects for the day:

 Replenishing the community mulch heap, weeding and pruning, cleaning leaves and debris from the roadside gutters, clearing the culverts (particularly that troublesome one outside Downderry) and filling in potholes.
- 28/08/2016 Replacement Trees for Bickleigh Vale Road: Three replacements of large trees which had been removed in recent years were provided by Yarra Ranges Shire and planted during the working bee. Area 1:
 - Former Quercus Coccifera (Kermes Oak) replaced with Quercus Rubra (Red Oak) in Bickleigh Vale Rd near the boundary between The Shielan and Hurst
 - Former Pinus muricata (Bishop Pine) replaced with Pinus pinea (Stone Pine) at the corner of Bickleigh Vale Rd and Pembroke Rd outside Hurst
- 27/11/2016 November working bee projects for the day:
 - Cleared roadside gutters and filled potholes
 - General weeding
 - Pruning since there are two properties currently for sale, we decided to keep pruning to a minimum during this working bee so that the village is presented at its best.
- 2/12/2016 December topping and grading Following previous discussions with the Shire after the last road maintenance work and our agreed plan for this time, more extensive work was carried out this time.
 - The contractor advised us that, all the topping used this time was Lilydale Toppings and it is now fully depleted
 - There was not enough to build up the turning circle sufficiently to create a profile with a gutter on the south-eastern side of the turning circle outside Littlewood but the depth of material on the turning circle is certainly an improvement
 - The contactor left us a metre of topping for later pot-hole filling as requested but, since there was not enough material at the part of the turning circle by the entrance to Windsong we spread the excess topping there and will wait until next time to have our 'pot-hole top-up pile.'
- 28/05/2017 May working bee:
 - Replenished the community mulch pile
 - Cleared roadside gutters and filled potholes
 - Weeded along Bickleigh Vale Rd
 - Continued clearing out overgrown vibernums from Edna Walling Lane triangle
 - Pruned around and above the recent plantings at the end of Bickleigh Vale Rd outside Hurst

- 29/06/2017 The first Coldstream topping of the road: It's topping and grading time again and with Lilydale topping now unavailable, Coldstream topping was used for the first time. Aesthetically, it looks pretty good and consistent with the heritage. We'll see over the next few months how durable it is.
- 28/07/2017 August working bee: Other than the usual filling of pot holes, weeding and pruning the special job we wanted to tackle this time was to reduce the jasmine build-up along the Homeleigh (formerly "Merewether") fence line.
- 7/03/2018 Dead and Dangerous Trees Inspection: We recently noticed two of our larger trees in Bickleigh Vale Road the pine outside Hurst and the gum outside Wimborne had big cracks in them and could present a danger to passers-by and properties so these were referred to the Shire for assessment along with the dead wattle in Edna Walling Lane. The arborist's report confirmed our fears and the trees need to be removed.
- 27/05/2018 May working bee: An army of rakers to clear the road and gutter of autumn leaves today. Potholes filled with the gravel from the gutter too and all along the roadside was weeded. Judicial pruning to keep roadside visibility.
- 28/05/2018 The dead and dangerous trees are gone looks a bit bare near Pembroke Rd. Following the inspection and assessment by the Shire back in March, three of our larger trees had to be felled and their stumps ground into mulch The large radiata pine outside Hurst has left a hole in the streetscape but the Swamp Gum outside Wimborne and the Wattle in Edna Walling Lane much less so. Replenishment of the community mulch pile and plenty of firewood for the village... once a few of us chainsaw it up and split it. Could take a while to clean up Devon Cottage's drive!
- 14/07/2018 Moving the Stone Pine: In August 2016 a number of trees and shrubs were planted to replace plants lost over the previous few years including a Stone Pine to replace the lost Bishop's Pine. The pine was planted outside Hurst and close to Pembroke Rd in place of the original tree and has been growing slowly but was overshadowed by nearby trees and bushy shrubs and, in addition, had been uprooted at one stage. With the removal of the dangerous radiata pine in May 2018, the Stone Pine was transplanted to the open space created in the hope that it will survive and thrive in its new location.
- 26/08/2018 August working bee: There wasn't much work needed this time mostly road maintenance.
 - A team of enthusiastic labourers aged from 5-y-o to 65-y-o, shovelled into a trailer, gravel that had been washed from the road into the gutter.
 - The gravel and roots out were cleared out from the culvert under Downderry's drive.
 - The gravel was carted down to the turning circle where the gravel was a bit light-on. There an even bigger team emptied the trailer and spread the gravel around. Looks pretty good!
 - Whilst it was mainly road maintenance, Carole and Chris got stuck into some serious pruning of undergrowth outside The Spinney
 - Allan and Peter had another crack at tidying up the stumps in the Edna Walling Lane triangle. End result looks good too!
- 25/11/2018 November working bee and more work on roadside trees:
 - It was a busy working bee today with potholes filled, gutters cleaned out and culverts unblocked. As usual for this time of year, there was plenty of weeding and pruning especially at the Pembroke Rd entrance.
 - Replanting Trees. Two trees were replanted to replace dead and dangerous trees removed last May.
 - We have a sick Red Oak needing attention. At the Pembroke Road entrance to Bickleigh Vale Rd outside Hurst, the Red Oak (Quercus rubra) is looking very unwell.
 - Two more dead trees identified for removal
 - The first is a Red Oak (Quercus rubra) in Bickleigh Vale Road outside Mistover.
 - The second is a Golden Rain Wattle (Acacia prominens in Edna Walling Lane outside Devon Cottage and immediately adjacent to the heritage stone wall.

10/02/2019 A dead Red Oak in Bickleigh Vale Rd and Golden Rain Wattle in Edna Walling Lane were earmarked for removal during last November's working bee and the Shire's contractor came today to remove them. To our surprise, when the contactor had packed up and gone, we found the trees with their tops removed but the dead trunks and roots still in place. We'll have a chat with the Shire and find out why!

24/02/2019 With the hot and dry conditions, growth of most of the roadside vegetation - including the weeds - has been limited but the gutter along Bickleigh Vale Rd needed clearing of gravel in (optimistic) preparation for the next heavy rain.

With a car and trailer starting at the Pembroke Rd end of Bickleigh Vale Rd and an army of workers, we cleared the gravel out of the gutter into the trailer. Once the gutter and the Downderry culvert were clear, and potholes in the road filled by Ezra, excess gravel was relocated and spread in the divided part of Edna Walling Lane at the Devon Cottage and The Barn entrances.

Whilst all the road construction work was going on, a small party worked on our two other items:

Outside Hurst at the Pembroke Rd entrance to Bickleigh Vale Rd, the cotoneasters need to be pruned back to let light through to the amelanchiers underneath

The euphorbia outside Mistover needs to be dead-headed so that it will flower well next season and to restrict the spread of seeds.

15/03/2019 In November last year, we identified that the Red Oak (Quercus rubra) at the Pembroke Road entrance to Bickleigh Vale Rd outside Hurst, was looking very unwell and we've sought advice as what to do to help it survive.

Advice from Paul of the Shire of Yarra Ranges tree management team was that it's poor condition is a combination of drought stress and almost certainly possum damage.

(The Oak opposite is completely intact and healthy as is the Poplar so the location should

(The Oak opposite is completely intact and healthy as is the Poplar so the location should be fine.)

There is not much the Shire can do but it would help to have someone deep water the tree once a week.

There is a lot of growth from other plants around it for possums the gain access. so we thought that, perhaps we could clear surrounding plants to stop the possums flight path to the tree. There is no power line access to the Oak tree for possums which is one positive.

Our community has rallied around and are implementing the following plan:

Peter has dug a trench around the sick Oak and Claire from Hurst has put the hose into the trench and happy to deep water it weekly for the rest of this dry period.

There is an abelia and a cotoneaster surrounding the Oak which Claire will also prune back gradually when the weather breaks and the plants are under less stress. If she needs help Claire will organise Peter to help with the height etc.

When the arborist used by a few of our residents is here to work on Sonningfield our trees, Coral will organise a possum collar for the oak tree.

Let's see how it goes over the next year or so.

Yarra Ranges recently advised that the Mitchell Quarry is closing and hence the supply of Lilydale toppings is running out permanently. There is perhaps a year or two left before we will have to change to a different product so Friends of Edna Walling need to the replacement between Coldstream and Castella toppings. The decision was to go with Coldstream toppings as it is closest in colour and consistency to the original Lilydale toppings.
- November 29th, 2015 Working Bee: Today saw the first major trees and shrubs replacement activity by Friends of Edna Walling since the original Roadside Vegetation Plan implementation with 39 new trees and shrubs provided by the Shire planted in 5 locations. Area 4:

At the problematic eastern end turning circle area of Bickleigh Vale Rd, during the storm, the creek broke its bank in a number of places and flowed across the road. This caused significant erosion of the edge of the road outside Wimborne's garage and Windsong's bridge. Not unexpectedly, we also lost a fair amount of mulch from the other side of the road so now the cardboard we laid under it some months ago as a weed mat is now exposed.

- Residents repaired damaged road as much and replaced mulch.

- 13/02/2017 Road Maintenance re-work completion. As planned the contractor from the Council came yesterday with truck of 6-8 m3 topping and a bobcat and levelled the bowl at the Bickleigh Vale Road turning circle. Replacement of Golden Rain Wattle outside Abbotsley and Littlewood (again!). Unfortunately, one of the Golden Rain Wattles planted last September didn't survive the dry period early this year.

It took quite a while to find a replacement one but here it is and we'll try again.

24/02/2019

With the hot and dry conditions, growth of most of the roadside vegetation - including the weeds - has been limited but the gutter along Bickleigh Vale Rd needed clearing of gravel in (optomistic) preparation for the next heavy rain.

With a car and trailer starting at the Pembroke Rd end of Bickleigh Vale Rd and an army of workers, we cleared the gravel out of the gutter into the trailer. Once the gutter and the Downderry culvert were clear, and potholes in the road filled by Ezra, excess gravel was relocated and spread in the divided part of Edna Walling Lane at the Devon Cottage and The Barn entrances.

Whilst all the road construction work was going on, a small party worked on our two other items:

Outside Hurst at the Pembroke Rd entrance to Bickleigh Vale Rd, the cotoneasters need to be pruned back to let light through to the amelanchiers underneath

The euphorbia outside Mistover needs to be dead-headed so that it will flower well next season and to restrict the spread of seeds.
